George D. Stuart, editor of the Tarentum (Pa.) News, says:

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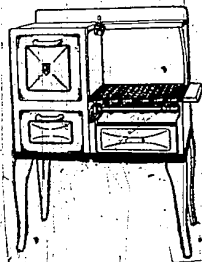
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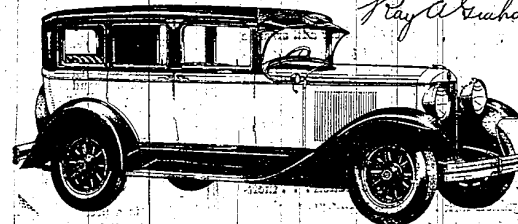


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
