

WOMAN POLITICIAN, DEAD AT 82, WAS ONCE PASTOR HERE

Rev. Olivia Woodman Became Famous Soon After Leaving Farmington

The death of Rev. Olivia Jane C. Woodman at Kalamazoo Saturday evening recalled to older residents of Farmington memories of another of the many men and women, who spent part of their lives in Farmington while on the way to fame. Farmington Universalist Church was one of the first pastorates held by Mrs. Woodman, shortly after she was ordained a pastor. In recent years she has been renowned as "the dean of Michigan's women politicians," and was nationally known.

Mrs. Woodman was in charge of the Farmington church in 1898, and it was only three years after she left Farmington that national recognition came to her. After her pastorate here, followed by another at Plymouth, she took so active an interest in the work of the Michigan State Grange that she was chosen as the principal speaker on Grange Day at the Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo in 1901.

Mrs. Woodman had been chosen chaplain of the State Grange before coming to Farmington, and held the post until her death, a period of 33 years. Besides her interest in the Grange, Mrs. Woodman was active in politics, working for woman suffrage, local option and prohibition. She was the first woman to make a nominating address at a Michigan Republican State convention, was a trustee of the Michigan Anti-Saloon League in 1901 and a campaign speaker for William Howard Taft in Colorado.

Mrs. Woodman was ordained a Universalist pastor at the age of 50, in 1897. A year after her ordination she was married to J. J. Woodman, who died a few years ago. Her first pastorate, just before coming to Farmington, was at Dewitt.

Mrs. Woodman, who was 82 years old, had been an invalid for a year. Funeral services took place at Paw Paw Wednesday.

Many older residents of Farmington recall Mrs. Woodman vividly as an exceptionally active worker in every endeavor.

The afternoon program will be concluded with old-time dancing and a ball game between 4-H members and the farm bureau members.

Drunken Driver Caught, Fined \$85 By Judge

Arrests of drunken drivers throughout this section continues, with another recorded during the past week. Howard D. Vanallsburg, 3905 Second boulevard, Detroit, was fined \$85 or 90 days in the County Jail by Judge John J. Schulte, following his arrest Saturday by Farmington deputy sheriffs.

Two companions of the driver were arrested on lesser charges, one being fined and the other being given a suspended sentence. They were Lloyd Decker, same address as Vanallsburg, arrested for being drunk, who was fined \$10, and "Booth" Fox, Fox was charged with being disorderly. Like the other two, he pleaded guilty. Sentence was suspended on Fox.

Vanallsburg's license to drive was revoked for 90 days.

MOTORIST IS KILLED AT 12-MILE CROSSING, WIFE AND SON HURT

Mrs. Eugene B. Wilhelm and son Warren are recovering from injuries suffered in the accident on the 12-Mile road in which Mr. Wilhelm lost his life last Friday evening, about midnight.

Shortly before the family group, on their way home from a school meeting at Brighton, where Mr. Wilhelm, who is an architect, was submitting plans, were laughing and joking together and a moment later they had crashed into the side of a Pere Marquette freight train, turning the car on its side and injuring Mr. Wilhelm so that he died immediately following his arrival at the Pontiac Hospital.


The accident occurred at the crossing west of Novi road.

The train crew were evidently not aware of the accident as the train did not stop and the mishap apparently was not discovered for about 30 minutes later.

Deputies W. E. Coe and Peter Schmidt were notified and they rushed to the scene, finding it necessary to cut through the top to reach the occupants. Mr. Wilhelm was nearly scalped and had lost considerable blood. Mr. Wilhelm and son were both unconscious.

The brakes had evidently not been used and the occupants of the car evidently did not see the train before the crash. The wrecked car was hauled to Wallied Lake by T. E. Bunn.
