FINED \$10 FOR RIDING IN BATHING SUIT IN AUTO AT WALLED LAKE

Oakland County deputies have been kept busy recently at and around Walled Lake, due to great crowds of picnickers, bathers and motorists. A number of law violators were brought before Judge John J. Schulte of Farmington.

Fred Whitehurst, of Walled Lake, arrested Sunday by Deputies Coo and Schmidt near Walled Lake, and charged with driving while drunk, was fined \$100 and his operators license revoked for 90 days.

J. Davis of Detroit, arrested by John C. Hess for riding in a car in a bathing suit, was taken before Judge Schulte by Deputy Schmidt and paid a fine of \$10, even though he stated he would ride straight through Oakland County in a bathing suit and defied the officers to stop him.

C. A. Conie, arrested by the deputies, was charged with reckless driving and will appear at Pontiac on Friday. He was stopped by the officers on the Commerce road with eight people on his roadster. One of the female members of the party was riding the hood and other members of the party on the front fenders made an almost perfect obstruction to the driver's view.

A Ford coupe, Model A, belonging to George W. Calkins, stolen from the south shore of the lake, was reported recovered in Chicago and the driver arrested. He is also reported to have stolen \$55 in cash, a \$5 check and a watch valued at \$45.

Charles Letey had his Cadillac Model 42 outboard motor stolen from his boat on the night of July 15.

FOUNDATION READY AT NEW BAPTIST BUILDING

Preliminary work is being carried forward rapidly for the new building to house the Sunday School of Farmington Baptist Church, at Division and Shiawassee streets. 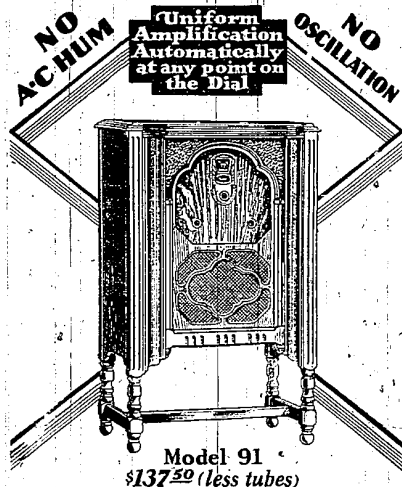
DOCTORS AND LAWYERS GATHER AT GLEN OAKS
