

PLAN TO FORM A BOYS' ALUMNI AT STATE FAIR

Organization of the 1200 alumni of the Boys' State Fair school, numbering some of the most successful farmers in Michigan, will cessful farmers in Michigan, will be undertaken at the 80th exposi-tion of the Michigan State Fair, September 1 to 7. The school, established 15 years ago as an agricultural educational proposi-tion, is made up of county win-pers of an annual state-wide ag-ricultural contest. Selection of this year's students took place late in June.

The attempt in September will be the first to organize an alumni association. Invitations to attend association. Invitations to attend are being sent to all former stu-dents. A huge tent will be pitch-ed on the grounds to house the organization program. Annual meetings are planned.

The Boys' State Fair school is a prominent educational feature of the State Fair. Entrants in the annual contest which determines its students are selected mainly for their, knowledge of farming, though any boy of good eighth grade standing is eligible. The test, however, is such that no boy not carefully propared can enter and have a fair chance of victory. Previous winners are barred. The examination in each county is under the supervision of the school commissioner. After fair the boys, with all traveling and other, expenses paid, are guests of the fair management. They are housed and fed on the grounds, and given an intensive agricultural course and daily physical exercises under qualified instructors. 
