

**PHONE LINES HELP**

Michigan's forest fire fighting system owes much of its effectiveness to the telephone lines built, acquired, and used by the conservation department in the opinion of H. J. Andrews, state fire chief. In discussing various phases of the fire hazard he has pointed out the great importance of quick communication from fire towers to the local fire wardens for ensuring immediate action on blazes before they reach the uncontrollable stage.

**CONTEST WILL SHOW QUALITY OF BUTTER**

A novel butterscoring contest in which all commercial buttermakers in Michigan are invited to compete has been initiated by the bureau of dairying, State Department of Agriculture, and Michigan State College. Each buttermaker who enters the contest tests and scores a sample of the butter he has manufactured and then sends a similar sample to the official judges to be scored by them.

**GRAHAM-PAIGE REVEALS NEW MODELS FOR 1930; PRICES ARE UNCHANGED**

Graham-Paige has introduced its 1930 models, presenting a line of three sixes and two eights replete with chassis and body improvements. All models except the lowest priced six have the standard shift four-speed transmission which has been a feature of the line for two and a half years, the Graham-Paige company having led the whole industry in recognizing the advantages of the four-speed drive and in perfecting its mechanism.

The 1930 models, although representing substantially increased value, are offered without change of price, beginning with \$885 for the two-door sedan in the 612 chassis, which is now built three inches longer than formerly and has a larger engine.

One of the most striking features of the new Graham-Paige line is an exclusive innovation—the use of adjustable seats, rear as well as front, in all six-cylinder models and the 127-inch wheelbase eight. The rear seat cushions offer a choice of two positions, changing the depth and slope of the seat. Full width front seats as well as the two separate seats of the two-door model 612 may be shifted mechanically, while occupied, over a wide range of position.

Since the clutch and brake pedals of all Graham-Paige cars, also except in the 612) the steering column, are fully adjustable, the new models offer the widest possible variation in driver and passenger position. In short, the Graham-Paige can be fitted to each individual as if built to his size and measurements. Summarized, the outstanding features of the Graham-Paige line for 1930 are as follows: A completely new model 612 chassis of 115-inch wheelbase and larger engine, giving increased power at lower engine speed (66 h. p. at 3,000 r. p. m.). Bodies of advanced structural design.

Superior riding comfort, attained not only through the adjustability of both front and rear seats, but through the use of over-padded seat cushions, forming seat and back contours, and extra seat and back springing. Clear-vision instrument panels, without ornamentation but strikingly handsome in appearance. New type glass wiper in chromium brackets (except 612). Three-spoke steering wheels (safety type), models 612 and 615.

The kitchen of the Ernest Monett family was badly damaged by fire on Thursday. The fire was caused by their oil stove.

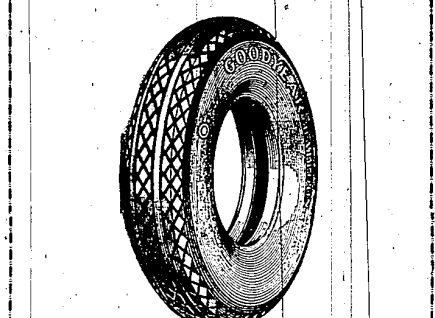
