



**WALLED LAKE SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION OF 4 DISTRICTS FAILS**

Consolidation of the Scotch, Eagle, Pine Lake and Green School Districts into a graded school district failed to carry at elections held at the four schools in Commerce Township Monday night.

Three of the schools voted to consolidate, but Pine Lake failed to carry. Scotch School district voted 23 for and 11 against. Eagle School 27 for and 17 against. The vote at the other schools was not reported.

The plan outlined was to consolidate the district and new buildings be built in the Eagle, Pine Lake and Green districts. Scotch School district already having a new building. The district would then be managed by a school board of five members.

The combined districts are reported to have a valuation of approximately \$8,000,000. Just what action will be taken now is not known.
