Farmington Boys Go To County 'Y' Meeting

The High School people of the County are to have a rare opportunity on Saturday, September 21, to spend an entire day at Cranbrook. Principle A. R. Crawford and at least six Farmington High School students will attend.

This event is in the nature of an Older Boys and Girls Conference under the auspices of the four Y. M. C. A. 'S of the county (Pontiac, Royal Oak, Birmingham and Pontiac Town and County) and the Oakland County School Masters Club.

The conference will center in Christ Church, Cranbrook, and the grounds of the estate and Cranbrook School Campus will be available for the use of the visitors.

But there are clubs and "clubs." Some, recently formed and promoted in this section are private corporations for profit. "Members" of this type of club may not vote or elect its officers, and have no right to, or interest in, its assets or profits.

Such a "club" sells service or "memberships" for the private gain of its stockholders.

When the salesmen asks you to "join" a club, find out whether you are really "joining," or merely buying a privilege or service. Have him call a spade—spade.

PRIZES BEING OFFERED FOR BEST NUT TREES

As a means of awakening interest in the possibilities of growing nuts for profit and to aid in locating fine specimens of nut bearing walnut and hickory trees, prizes of 25 and 10 dollars for the first and second prize winners in each class are offered by the horticultural department of Michigan State College.

Each entry for this contest must consist of 25 specimens of nuts of each species submitted, and the entry must be accompanied by directions which make it possible to locate the tree upon which the nuts grew. The nuts should be sent to the horticultural department before November 8. It is the intention of the department of horticulture to obtain clones from the good trees to use in top working stocks which can be used for commercial planting.

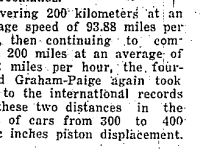
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AMERICAN CAR REGAINS TWO SPEED RECORDS

After winning two records early last spring, only to have them exceeded later in the season, America has regained the 200-kilometer and the 200-mile international records from France, through the performance of an eight-cylinder Graham Paige on England's famous track at Brooklands.

Covering 200 kilometers at an average speed of 93.88 miles per hour, then continuing to complete 200 miles at an average of 92.52 miles per hour, the four speed Graham-Paige again took title to the international records for these two distances in the class of cars from 300 to 400 cubic inches piston displacement.



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
