



**OLDEST OAKLAND IN THREE-CAR "STABLE" DATES BACK TO 1916**

There wouldn't be any used cars for sale if all automobile buyers were like William Butzer, president of the Butzer Packing Company of Salina, Kan. Like a majority of motorists, Mr. Butzer occasionally succumbs to the lure of a bright new car. But there the resemblance ends as he refuses to part with his old cars. His "stable" now includes three Oaklands which he has been buying and driving since back in 1916.

The oldest of the three cars is a high-topped touring model which has been driven far beyond the 100,000 mile mark. The second was purchased in 1924 shortly after Oakland had staged a nation-wide demonstration of four-wheel brakes with its fleet of "True Blue Travellers." The speedometer of this car now carries more than 50,000 miles. The latest of the trip is an Oakland All-American landaulet sedan which Mr. Butzer has driven only 1,500 miles.
