Efforts are again being made by the residents of the south shore of Walley Lake to have the outlet taken care of. Last spring considerable agitation was aroused and an attempt made to have the outlet fixed but no action taken except a slight cleaning of the drain under the road at the southwest corner of the lake. Efforts to have a dam constructed there were unavailing and this fall the water has fallen to a low level.

In the spring the water probably will not be permitted to flow away fast enough and if a wet season arrives residents along the shore will again be bothered with high water.

COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Regular meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington held October 7, 1929.

Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:40 p. m. Commissioners present, Hattton, Hogle, Gildemeister, Otis, Goers and Staman. Minutes of the meeting of September 16 read and approved. Motion made by Otis, seconded by Hogle that a record of water boxes bought in September, 1927 by the firm of Hattton and Dickerson and the Warner Estate be placed on file. Carried.

Mayor Lamb appointed a committee consisting of Hogle, Hattton and Gildemeister to inspect the basement of the Fire Hall and report on the practicability using it for storage purposes.

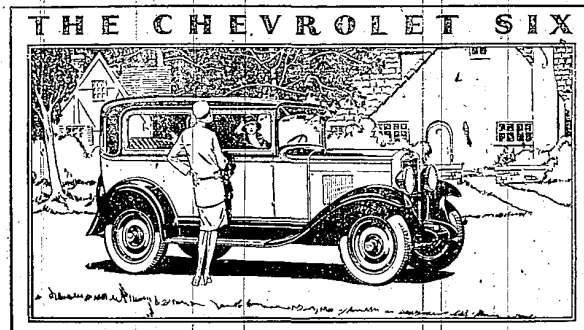
