Place At Embro, In
Canada

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at Farmington Baptist Church and at Embro, Ont. for John Sim, who suffered fatal injuries when he fell into the basement of the new Baptist Sunday School, building last week. Burial took place at Embro.

Rev. Elmer Palmer officiated at the services in both services. Rev. and Mrs. Palmer, Mrs. A. C. MacDonald and Mrs. Orville Taggart accompanied the body to Ontario for the services there. Mrs. Sim returned with them.

Surviving the deceased besides his widow are a sister, Mrs. George Killing of Howell, and three brothers, Oliver of Embro, Ont., at whose home services were held, James, of Woodstock, Ont., and Frank of Washington.

TO LICENSE PLUMBERS

Approximately 5,000 Michigan plumbers will be affected by the new law which went into operation August 28, requiring the licensing after January 1, 1930, of all plumbers in the state, according to announcement from the Michigan Department of Health which has supervision of the enforcement of the law.

MAY BUILD A RAMP

Possibilities of obtaining grant use of the fire hall building will be investigated by a committee of Farmington City Commissioners. It has been suggested that building of a ramp into the basement would make it possible to use that part for storing tools, sand for the streets in winter, etc.

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
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
