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FIFTEEN HUNDRED AT OPENING OF SUNSET BALLROOM

New Dancing Place On Grand River Attracts Many; Musquerade Next Week

With more than 1,500 people attending the opening Saturday night, the beautiful, new Sunset Ballroom at Redford was opened to the public Saturday night. The hall, located on Grand River avenue and occupying 10,000 square feet of floor space, is one of the most beautiful in the northwest section of the metropolitan area.

Dancing is held at the ballroom every night except Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights are "social nights," with dancing free on the admission charge of 65 cents for men and 35 cents for ladies. Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights the "mark play" is in effect—admission is 35 cents for men and 25 cents for ladies, and five cents a couple for each dance.

On Thanksgiving eve, next Wednesday, a Thanksgiving masquerade will be held with prizes for the best costumes, and free turkeys.

The new ballroom may be rented on Monday nights for parties, according to James Watkins, manager.

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
