Sixty children were killed in September and 359 in nine months in Michigan, Of the num-ber killed in nine months 72 were killed by railroad trains and 20 in collision with street cars.

Of the sixteen counties having more than 15 fatals that there were only three that had a reduction while one auplicated the 1928 record. Eleven had increases the most outstanding being Monroe County, where eight were killed by their automobile colliding with railroad trains.
