Helm resigned from Bethel Evangelical Church in pro-test against the church council's refusing to admit two Negroes to membership in the Christmas class, was sollows: "I exult in the couragi of any minister who insist that Chris-tianity means brotherhood, if it means anything, and is ready to hack up his convictions by with-drawing from the serviced of any church that repudiates vit. Mr. Helm has taken the only logical course under the circuistances. "My own belief is that? Megroes are not hany in churches or off-er social groups made up pre-dominantly of white people, and, as a matter of present expedien-cy, it would be better for them to seek association with those of their own race; but I indvocate this only on the grounds of ex-pediency. As an absolute princi-ple of Christian practice, there can be only one answer. "The Christian realing of the formation.

ple of Christian practice, there can be only one answer, "The Christian religion is founded upon the doctrine of hu-man equality, regardless of race or color. For any Christian church to deny memberahip to a Negro is to make a cynical denial of that doctrine. More Than \$5,000 Received By Treasurer Through New System; City Bills Mailed
