Marriage certificates fall and divorce decrees shoot up. Matrimony is battling a bear market according to census bureau statistics for 1928—just issued. In spite of the gain in population there were in the U. S. A. 18,556 fewer marriages in 1928 than in 1927. The number of divorces, on the other hand increased from 192,037 in '27 to 195,939 in '28. Marriages decreased 1.5 per cent, while divorces increased 2 per cent. The ratio in some states is staggering. In Wyoming, for instance, the ratio was one divorce to every 2.4 marriages; in California it was one to every 3.3. Whither is the ship of matrimony drifting? Is it going to finally founder on the rocks of whoopee!

ABOUT LISTED STOCKS—

DON'T YOU BE MISLED. In selfish attempts to cause panic among owners of listed securities, unscrupulous stock salesmen are pointing to the recent market drop in listed stocks as an argument to buy their own inflated "pet" offerings.

While, in many cases, the market prices of securities listed on the recognized stock exchanges of the country have shown a decline, it is significant that the companies themselves continue to prosper, and with few exceptions, declare dividends with consistent regularity.

Don't be stampeded into selling valuable securities in order to buy doubtful offerings of concerns which may never have paid a dividend.

While, of course, many reputable securities are unlisted, the only basis for the promoter's at-

tempt to "scare you" out of listed securities is to line his own pockets for the future. By holding on, and refusing to sell valuable securities because of the fluctuations of a speculative market, why not line your own pockets for the future, instead?


ARM WOMAN WINS U. S.
