## WALLED LAKE-PONTIAC ROAD IS STATE HIGHWAY

The Walled-Lake-Pontiac-Ann Arbor road has been accepted by the State as a State trunk line. L. D. Allen, chairman of the Oakland County Road Commission informed a reporter this week, referring to a previous article regarding the road. Mr. Allen stated he was in Lansing this week and had Grover Dillman, State Highway Commissioner look up the records on the matter.

The road was recommended by the Highway Commission on February 11, 1928 and accepted by the State Administrative Board on April 3, 1928. While the County is still maintaining the road, it is a State trunk line.

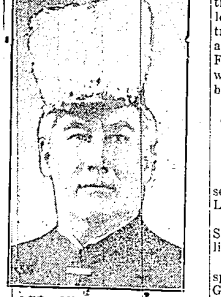
## TO SING AT DETROIT

## R. YOUNG TO SEEK COMMERCIAL JOB ON 'STICKERS'

Eight Ballots Required To Decide Nomination At Township Republican Caucus

For the first time in years, a contest is indicated in the Commerce Township election. It is expected Robert W. Young, who was defeated by E. G. Carey at the Republican Caucus at Walled Lake on Saturday will be a sticker candidate for the office of Highway Commissioner at the spring election, April 7. Mr. Carey won the nomination on the eighth ballot, at the Caucus, having 82 votes out of the 162 cast on this ballot, the exact number required for a majority. He had four more votes than Mr. Young who received 78.

The contest for Highway Commissioner enlivened an otherwise routine meeting. Thomas Fields was the first name nominated his name being presented by Frank Burton. Mr. Young was nominated by J. A. Fridenberg and Mr. Carey by George W. Needles. Mr. Fields received his largest number of votes on the second ballot, 43 being cast for him. He withdrew his name after the third ballot. Carey led on the first four ballots and then Young led for the fifth, sixth and seventh ballots. On the eighth Mr. Carey received the required number to receive the nomination. The votes received by Carey and Young were: first ballot, Carey 62, Young 52; second, Carey 57, Young 53; third, Carey 62, Young 52; fourth, Carey 79, Young 70; fifth, Young 75, Carey 74; sixth, Young 81, Carey 80; seventh, Young 81, Carey 80; eighth, Carey 82, Young 78. On each ballot there were a number of scattering votes.

Following the seventh ballot, an attempt was made to adjourn the meeting until 8 p. m., but the motion did not carry.

Joseph A. Long was nominated as supervisor by acclamation without opposition. Lee Welch was nominated as Clerk by ballot receiving 121 votes, 24 scattering votes being cast.

William King was nominated for office of treasurer without opposition. Ross Carey was chosen as candidate for the position of highway overseer receiving 53 votes. Charles Ruggles received 45 and Clare Hays 2. Fred Ruggles was named Justice of the Peace for the full term being placed in nomination by F. J. Malcolm. Theodore Gutch was nominated for Justice of the Peace to fill the unexpired term of E. F. Coe who was elected last year but failed to qualify.

Constables were elected by acclamation, those chosen being E. L. McQuern, Judd Furman, Byrle Hines and William King. Harvey Spencer received the nomination for Board of Review.

Fred M. Bicking was chairman of the meeting and Cameron E. Rose, secretary. The tellers were J. A. Fridenberg, C. T. Parks, Mrs. Henry Andrews, Roy Gamble and Mrs. Erle Welch.
