

"HOT CHOCOLATES" WILL BE AT WILSON THEATRE DURING THE NEXT WEEK

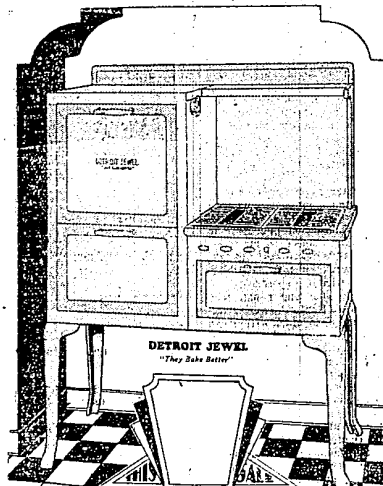
