ARE FROM \$25 TO \$50
ON SEVEN 1930 MODELS

Announcement of substantially reduced prices on the new 1930 Chevrolet Six, at the same time that the car embodying many distinct improvements made its public bow, created a sensation in automotive circles.

Reductions as announced by W. S. Knudsen, president and general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company, range from \$25 to \$50 on seven of the twelve models in the 1930 line, while three new body types introduced for the first time this year are

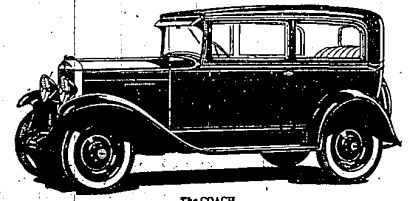
