F. H. S. GRADUATES FORM TWO TEAMS; GIRLS WIN FIRST

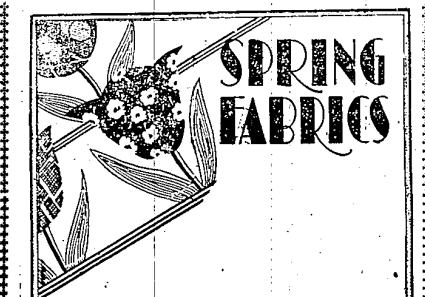
Young Men And Women Schedule Games With Nearby Teams; Defeat Walled Lake
