OAKLAND REDUCES ITS LOST-TIME ACCIDENTS

Accidents involving lost time in the Oakland-Pontiac plants during 1929 were 24 per cent less than those in 1928, according to a report just issued by W. D. Thompson, safety director for the Oakland Motor Car Co.

There were 217 lost-time accidents in 1929, Thompson reported, as against 279 the previous year. The record is more significant he said, in view of the increased activity of the company last year, which involved nearly 2,000,000 more man hours of labor than in 1928.

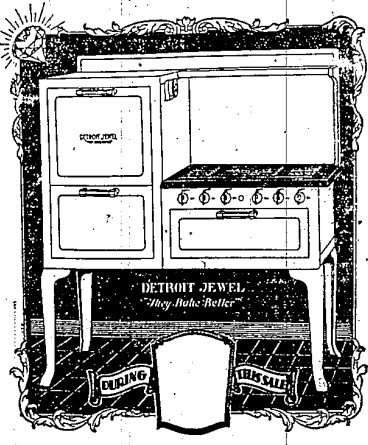
