ORION MAN SPEAKS AT WALLED LAKE CHURCH

Taking as his subject "Development of Life" Rev. F. E. Wajler of Orion kept his audience at Walled Lake M. E. church last Friday night interested and entertained. He referred to the development of transportation, telephone and other items and then traced the development of a child from birth to 24 years of age. He pictured clearly the different stages, the ages 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, and 25, developing its hearing and sight, from three to five when the baby begins to acquire its vocabulary. He spoke of the necessity of correct training so that the environment would not crop out in later years.

The ages from five to nine he called the imaginative period, when the imagination of the child runs wild. From 9 to 12 he pictured the reckless period, the period when clothes mean nothing to the boy, and girls mean even less to him.

Between the ages of 12 and 16, Rev. Walker stated the boy or girl will fall in love. "This is the period when they set their ideal. The boy begins to wash his wrist, comb his hair and buys a tooth brush."

From 16 years on the foundation for life must be built. The importance of thrift must be stressed, the value of a dollar shown and the necessity of observing the physical and mental and moral laws impressed upon their minds, he stated. He condemned the foul magazines, movies and other literature.

He asked his hearers to give the boys and girls more of their time, to get to know their children. He said "Our social duties are so many we haven't time, we are out every night, the boy is out every night and nobody but the cat and God knows when they come in."

Miss Mabel Roderick of Franklin sang two vocal numbers at the start of the program, Darrel Johnson completed the program with two piano solos. Preceding the program the Ladies' Aid served a fish supper in the basement.
