Discuss Lease Value

Much of the discussion at the meeting concerned with the value of the 935-acre lease which was given the Masonic Lodge by the Township Board in 1876.

It is stated that the property was purchased for \$800, of which \$400 was appropriated by the township and \$400 raised by popular subscription. The Masonic Lodge contends that a large part of the \$400 raised by subscription was obtained from Ma-chow's contributions were much influenced by the fact that the Lodge was to occupy the second story of the building.

The Masonic Lodge, in building the second story, paid about one-fourth of the cost of the entire building, it is stated.

Although he says that in all the "Middletowns" of America "comforts and conveniences abound, while the joy and beauty of living is lost," yet "the picture is not all dark. . . Men are asking questions and demanding reality. We, as ministers, are being warned. . . New leaders are appearing, greeting the vision from afar. They are marching on to seize the victories that might have been ours to win."
