Direct from its run of more than an entire season in Manhattan, "Follow Thru" has come to the Cass Theatre, Detroit this week. This lively musical comedy began a limited engagement in Detroit last evening before a crowded house that seemed to find great enjoyment in what it saw and listened to.
"Follow Thru" deals with the game of golf in the same dashing manner that the earlier Schwab and Mandel show, "Good News," presented the sunny side of university life. Its colorful scenes record the activities in and about a glorified country club. The Messrs. Schwab and DeSylvia, concoctors of the book, have fashioned what seems a perfect libretto for this sort of entertaining frolic and the players who take part seem to be having as royal a time as the audience.

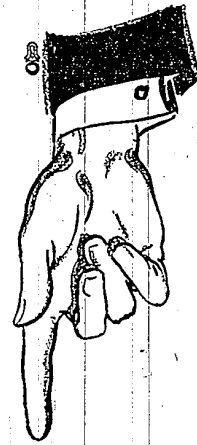
