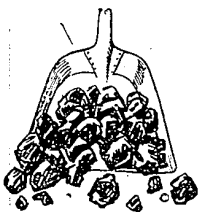

MACHINE STRIKES ABUTMENT, DRIVER DIES OF INJURIES

Accident Victim Expires In Pontiac Hospital Following Crash Near Wixom

Hugh Parker of the Milford-Wixom road, was fatally hurt last Monday night when his car struck a cement abutment on the Milford-Wixom road about a mile from his home. Parker was evidently travelling at a high rate of speed and the car skidded into an abutment near the Wixom Cemetery. He was taken from the car by passing motorists and brought to Walled Lake to the office of Dr. E. J. Lindsay and later taken to a Pontiac hospital. His car was demolished. When Parker was removed from the car it was found he was paralyzed from the hips down and internal injuries and a fractured spine made his chances of recovery seem impossible, but he was reported slightly improved on Thursday and some hope was felt. He made his home with E. J. Bosaw and was employed last summer at the Hickory Hill Golf Club. Parker died Friday in the hospital.

Mrs. Hursh Unhurt Mrs. H. W. Hursh of Walled Lake escaped injury, but her car was damaged and thrown into a ditch on the Maple road Sunday evening just about dark, when struck by a car driven by a Birmingham resident. Mrs. Hursh was driving toward Walled Lake and met the other car coming toward her with only one headlight, it is reported and the left front wheel of her car struck the rear of the other. Both cars were damaged, but no one was hurt.

DECLARES A NEW DRIVER'S LICENSE LAW NECESSARY

"Unfit Must Be Eliminated From The Highways," Says Judge

That a new driver's license law is necessary if present traffic conditions are to be remedied, was the opinion expressed by Municipal Judge John J. Schulte in a recent statement. "It is necessary," said Judge Schulte "to eliminate from the highways, those not fitted mentally or physically to operate motor vehicles. Under the present system of securing driver's licenses a man may keep his license several years after he has become incapable of driving a car safely. Oftentimes a driver's license is ten or fifteen years old. "In some states motorists realize that their privilege of driving is a valuable one. They safeguard this privilege by driving carefully, knowing they will lose it if they fail to heed the law and the rights of others. In other localities we find motorists with a thoughtless disregard for the law, for the right to drive is a common privilege and one never withdrawn."

Discussing the causes of accidents, Judge Schulte said: "There are three conditions under which traffic accidents occur. They are: Condition of vehicle; condition of road, and condition of character of driver. We find that virtually every accident comes under one of these divisions. "The most important, of course, is the last one. The unfit driver will cause more accidents than the unfit car or the bad road. The capable driver ascertains that his car is in good working condition before he drives it, and he exercises caution where there are physical hazards along the road. "Thus, the logical way to prevent traffic accidents is to require drivers to renew their licenses at least every two years (once a year would not be too often). By eliminating unfit drivers, accidents will be minimized."
