Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Giegler spent Wednesday in Farmington on business, motoring from Hartland. They called on relatives here.

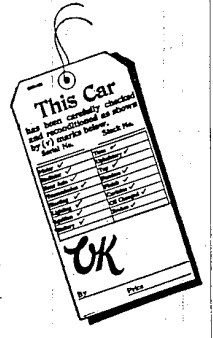
