 equal to the arbitrary standard which you have set up."
 "Public Confidence"
 "As to the holding of closed meetings, I believe that open meetings would afford greater confidence to the public in this Board's work. When closed meetings are held, the public has no way of determining what objections may be raised to the various candidates. As parents, we have at least a moral right to all the information available about the candidates who wish to guide our children. Certainly it would be an act, engineering more confidence in the minds of the public if the credentials of each considered in the minds of the public in open meeting."

At this point Emil Roos, husband of Mrs. Roos, arose. "It is perhaps unfortunate that I should be here said Mr. Roos. "But I rise to a point of order to ask the chair what an executive session means."
 "The secretary will now read the definition of an executive session," said Mrs. Roos.
 Mrs. Florence Lee, secretary, then read the following which is taken from a book entitled, "Parliamentary Usage For Women's Clubs," by Mrs. Emma Fox. It is as follows:
 "To go into executive session, is a motion which is made when the members wish all except members to withdraw. When this motion is carried, visitors who understand the significance of the motion will withdraw immediately without further intimation of the wishes of the assembly. The secretary continues to keep a record of all proceedings during the time the assembly remains in executive session."

that the secretary keeps the minutes in detail, what is going on so that any person can find out." I am surprised that when a Board has been elected by the citizens, that the citizens should not give the Board confidence in their acts. They have a right to go into executive session and exclude us. If the Board has not the confidence of the people, I am sure that the Board is ready to resign."
 "I interviewed Frank Coe, Superintendent of Schools in Detroit today," continued Mr. Roos. "And asked him for advice. He said he would tell Mr. Crawford to stick on the job and get his M. A. degree, because he will need it. I also asked Phil Lovejoy and he said the same thing. Instead of this Board being criticized for trying to raise the standards, they should have all our support."

Mrs. Lee then moved that the Board go into executive session, to talk over credentials and eliminate candidates." Trustee F. T. Macomber supported the motion. "If there are no more remarks," said Mrs. Roos, "we will vote on the motion to go into executive session." All those in favor say "aye."

Mrs. Lee and Trustee F. T. Macomber said "aye."
 "Aye," added Mrs. Roos. "Carried."
 The citizens present then left the room and went into the corridor, where they remained until the executive session was over. It was reported later that the Board had eliminated the candidates asked to resign. Trustee Gullen asked that he be allowed to examine the credentials filed by the candidates, numbering about 30, and they were turned over to him for perusal. It is understood that all are from men having a master's degree.

"Did Not Withdraw"
 Mr. Gullen, interviewed after the meeting, said he had not withdrawn Mr. Crawford's peti-


tion. "Either the other members of the Board are mistaken, or I certainly did not know what I was saying. I would hardly be likely to withdraw Mr. Crawford's name after urging his appointment. Further, I would have no right to do so. Only Mr. Crawford himself has authority to withdraw his application."



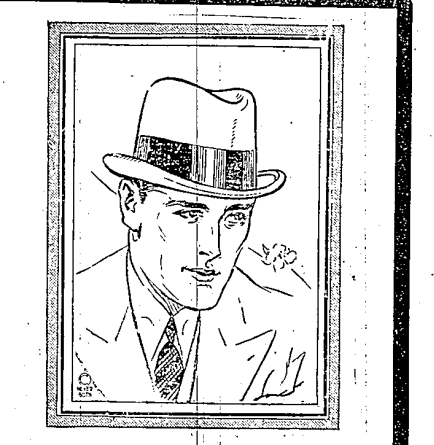
