BIAS TAPE REDUCES THE COST OF CLOTHING

The use of bias tape to furnish attractive finishing touches to clothing, curtains, or luncheon sets was shown at 2251 Michigan last night at group meetings held in eight counties by members of the home economics extension staff at Michigan State College.

The tape is inexpensive and can be easily applied. The fast colors of the material enable it to withstand laundering well and for this reason, the tape is better for trimming children's garments than other decorative materials.

Color harmonies desired in curtains or in luncheon sets can easily be obtained through the use of bias tape. A wide range of colors is manufactured and nearly any desired shade can be obtained.

Basketball Player Is Badly Hurt In Practice

Sam Smith of the Walled Lake basketball team remains in a serious condition at a Northville hospital following a serious injury in a basketball scrimmage at the Walled Lake School on Friday night of last week.

An operation was performed on Saturday and very little hope was felt at that time for his recovery but he has held his own very favorably and his recovery is now expected.

A game was scheduled for Friday night with a Pontiac team, but as the car which the players were riding in skidded into the ditch and they did not arrive, the team was having a scrimmage among themselves, when Mr. Smith fell, injuring himself.

In a previous game he had felt the same sort of a pain and it had passed away and he thought this was from the same thing and caused by previous operation.

He suffered a great deal of pain but finally went home. A doctor was called, but he failed to recuperate and Saturday he was taken to the hospital where his condition was found to be exceedingly serious. An immediate operation was made and he has gradually grown better.

School Boards Meet With State Officials

Teachers, members of boards of educations and interested patrons of school affairs in this part of Oakland County, will meet at the Walled Lake Consolidated school on Monday, March 10 for an all day meeting to consider and discuss school problems.

The State Department of Education requires that School Boards meet with one or more members of the State Department every two years to discuss school problems. Four days will be spent in Oakland County by members of the department, Walled Lake, Holly, Oxford and Royal Oak.

The purpose of the meetings is to enable the teachers and taxpayers to know school boards problems.

Speakers will be Dr. M. S. Pittman of Ypsilanti, Dr. D. E. Burnham of Kalamazoo, E. J. Lederle, County superintendent of schools and his assistant, A. G. Leonard and one or more members of the State department.

Miss Ethel O'Connor, a member of Mr. Lederle's staff, states the meeting will be for information, inspiration and to promote good fellowship. The meetings will be held in the gymnasium and will start at 10. Dinner will be served at noon at the Methodist Church. It is expected about 200 people will be present. The Walled Lake School will continue in session in order that visitors may see how it functions.

Most of the interested school boards in the surrounding territory will give their teachers per-

mission to close their schools in order to attend the meeting.

Six years ago, when E. J. Lederle became County superintendent of schools, he made a survey of the rural and village schools. Another survey of rural schools was made this year and the achievements of the rural schools will be shown. Posters and grafs will be displayed.

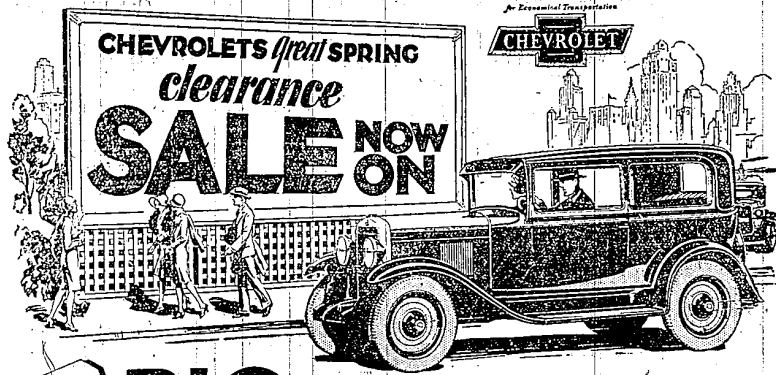
