WALLED LAKE H. S. GIRLS DEFEAT BRIGHTON TEAM

Then Harris dropped in a long basket, and Campbell followed with a score which put the blue and gold as near their opponents as they came all night. From then on the home team continued to score baskets until the score had reached 29 to 5 at the end of the third quarter. In the final period Walled Lake rallied and held their rivals even.

Harris and Campbell each scored twice for Walled and Eno got the other basket.

CLIMBING ABILITY OF OAKLAND EIGHT SHOWN

The powerful new Oakland Eight, flashing up the most difficult hills in America, continues to merit its quickly-earned reputation as an exceptional hill-climber.

Its latest achievement—accelerating in high gear up the steep Queen Anne Counter-balance Hill at Seattle—drew enthusiastic comment from the three Seattle automobile editors who were passengers in the car. The hill, long a test grade for ambitious drivers, has a steep street at its base and mounts steadily until in its last 300 feet it attains the difficult angle of more than 18 per cent. Under unfavorable traction conditions due to a heavy rain and with a driver and the three newspaper men as passengers, the Oakland Eight topped the hill in high gear at 12 miles per hour.

On a second test with only two men in the car, it attained a speed of 25 miles per hour at the crest of the hill.

YEARLY COST \$8,000,000

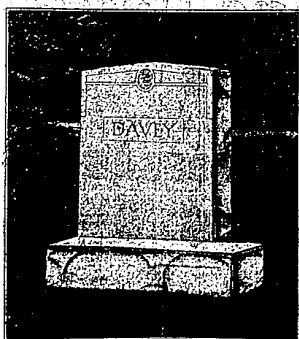

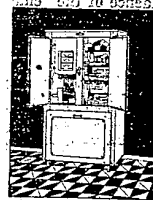
