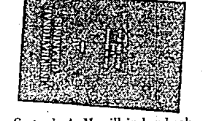
MRS. E. BROWN GRANTED DIVORCE FROM R. BROWN

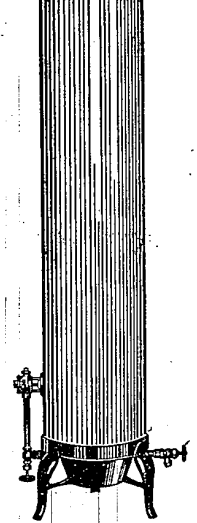
