

To determine which is the right and left sleeve after cutting out the material, fold the sleeve through the center lengthwise with the sleeve seam edges together. If one side of the sleeve is only slightly higher than the other and the top curve of the front and back lie in the same general direction, the high side is the back. At the lower end, too, the back will extend beyond the front.

## COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Regular meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington, held March 17, 1930. Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:40 p. m. Commissioners present, Stamman, Gildemeister, Hatton, Goers, Otis and Hogle. Minutes of the meeting of March 3 read and approved.

Commissioners Stamman and Gildemeister were appointed a committee to look after insurance for the City Firemen.

Commissioners Gildemeister and Otis were appointed a committee to investigate the proposed removal of the street car tracks.

Commissioner Stamman was given permission to hire a suitable man to run water. Commissioner Hatton and G. H. Ruhling, civil engineer, explained the different sewer plans at length and probable cost of each. Mayor Lamb also spoke upon the subject of the public water. He met up with the City Engineer's subject at Dearborn where estimates of the cost were considerably lower than Mr. Ruhling's. After much discussion a recess was taken until March 18 at 4:00 p. m.

Recessed meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington held March 18, 1930.

Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 4:15 p. m. Commissioners present, Stamman, Gildemeister, Hatton, Otis, Goers. The following resolution was introduced by Otis and seconded by Stamman.

RESOLVED that the plans and estimates for sewers as furnished by Geo. H. Ruhling and Company, engineers employed by the special committee at Dearborn, Mich., Goers, under direction of the City Council, to prepare such plans and estimates, be accepted and placed on file.

Moved by Hatton, seconded by Gildemeister that this resolution be adopted.

Adopted by the following votes: Ayes, Goers, Otis, Stamman, Hatton, Gildemeister. Nays, None. Absent, Hogle.

Resolution No. 2

March 18, 1930

WHEREAS, it is deemed by this Commission to be advisable to extend and improve the sewer system of the City of Farmington as follows:

To construct a sewer on Grand River avenue from Brookdale avenue to Farmington road;

On Maple avenue from Grand River avenue to Cloverdale avenue, on Cloverdale avenue from Maple avenue to Power avenue, on Power avenue from Cloverdale avenue to Southern 300 feet;

thence Easterly across lots, to Brookdale Avenue crossing Brookdale avenue and continuing Easterly across lots to River Rouge;

On Orchard street from Farmington road to Grove street; thence Southeasterly parallel to Grand River avenue 700 feet; thence Northeasterly 350 feet to Grand River avenue;

In Thomas street from Farmington road Easterly 500 feet to existing sewer;

On Power avenue from Shawassee street Southerly to River Rouge;

AND WHEREAS, plans and estimates of the cost of such extension and improvement have been prepared and submitted to this Commission;

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that it is advisable and necessary to extend and improve the sewer system of the City of Farmington as above set forth, and that the cost of such extension and improvement is hereby estimated to be the sum of \$55,000.00.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the estimated period of usefulness of such extension and improvement is not less than thirty (30) years.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that for the purpose of raising said sum of \$55,000.00 for such extension and improvement of the sewer system, it is deemed advisable to borrow the sum of \$55,000.00 and issue the bonds of the City therefor;

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the question of borrowing said sum of \$55,000.00 and issuing the bonds of the City therefor, for the purpose aforesaid, be submitted to the qualified electors of the City for their approval at a special election hereby called to be held on Tuesday, March 26, 1930, at 8 p. m., in said City on Monday, April 28, 1930, between the hours of 7 a. m. and 8 p. m. Eastern Standard Time.

Sec. 10—Registering of Electors: Regular Session of 1921—Any absent voter, as defined in this act, whose name is not registered and who shall claim the right to vote by absent voter's ballot at any election or primary election, may at the time of making application for absent voter's ballot, present to the township clerk an affidavit for registration, the form of which may be obtained from the Township Clerk.

## REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH

Sec. 9—Part II—Chap. III. If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election or primary election, and shall, UNDER OATH state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the TOWNSHIP TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election or primary election, designating book of the precinct from which he or her residence and that he or she possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution; and that owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or herself or some member of his or her family, or owing to his or her absence from the TOWNSHIP on public business or his or her own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he or she was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election or primary election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he or she shall then be permitted to vote at such election or primary election. If such applicant shall be found guilty of perjury, and upon conviction, he or she shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and upon conviction, be subject to the pains and penalties thereof.

Provision In Case of Removal to Another Precinct. Sec. 11—Part II—Chap. III. Any registered and qualified voter who has REMOVED FROM ONE ELECTION PRECINCT of a TOWNSHIP to another election precinct of the same TOWNSHIP shall have the right, on any day previous to election, or primary election day, on application to Township Clerk, to have his or her name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he or she HAS REMOVED to the registration book of the precinct to which he or she THEN RESIDES. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on any ELECTION or Primary election day by obtaining from the board of inspectors of such election or primary election of the precinct from which he or she HAS REMOVED CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER and presenting the said certificate to the BOARD OF ELECTION INSPECTORS OF THE PRECINCT IN WHICH HE OR SHE THEN RESIDES.
