He was struck by an automobile driven by Miss Olga Jacobs of Pontiac as he ran across a Pontiac street to get to a Detroit Edison Company truck late Thursday afternoon. He did not regain consciousness, and although he seemed to respond to treatment in the morning his failure to rally caused hospital authorities to believe he suffered internal injuries. His skull was fractured.

Mr. Spencer, who is employed by the Detroit Edison Company, was crossing the street from his work to get in the truck to go home when he was struck. Two deputy sheriffs, who were immediately behind the car which hit him, witnessed the accident and took him to the hospital, where his father, H. Spencer and his wife were, called.

COTTAGES DESTROYED BY FLAMES AT BEACH

A fire starting in a new cottage under construction destroyed this structure and the cottage next to it in Twin Beach subdivision, northeast of Walled Lake Wednesday afternoon about 6:00. The West Bloomfield fire department was called, but the high wind and big start the fire had, made it impossible to save the cottage. Both places were the property of H. Kelly of Detroit, owner of a hotel there. The cottage was one of the finest on the subdivision, situated on Middle Straits Lake in the grove, having been sold a short time ago for \$10,000. It was formerly owned by a man by the name of Bird and was known as "The Bird's Nest." The Kellys had renamed it the "Kelly Mae." The origin of the fire is a mystery, and an investigation was being made by the fire chief of the West Bloomfield Department.

The first grass fire of the season called out the Walled Lake fire department on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The fire got so close to the buildings at the home of L. A. Fisk that Mrs. Fisk called for aid. The truck was taken out by William H. Glover.

EXCHANGE AVIATION DINNER APRIL 9th

The 34 Exchange Cubs located in Wayne and Oakland counties, and the cities of Mt. SAYS POVERTY IS MORE EXPENSIVE THAN CRIME

Decrying the tendency in many quarters to think only of new ways to raise more taxes without giving attention to how the money is spent, State Representative Verne Brown, editor of the Ingham County News, at Mason, told an audience of Lansing business men on February 11 that crime and poverty are the twin evils of the taxpayers' purse.

"Poverty," said Rep. Brown, "costs three times as much as crime, although we hear more about the latter. Eight cents out of every dime spent through the Ingham county treasurer's office goes into some form of public relief or attempt to control crime." Inefficiency resulting from overlapping jurisdictions was pointed out by Mr. Brown as adding large sums to the cost of welfare work. He cited the case of a woman who had been maintained by the county in a hospital at a cost of about \$2,000 when she might have been cared for at her home for \$400 or \$500 at the most. This condition resulted from horse-play between the County and Township officers as the \$2,000 hospital bill was paid by the County, while if the case had been treated at home, the Township would have borne the expense.

Representative Brown urged the passage of a law which would give all counties the option of placing every public welfare service under the control of a board of five, which would include the circuit judge, the probate judge, the chairman of the county board of supervisors, and two paid specialists, one a director of public health, and the other a director of social work. The plan was recommended as a step toward reduction of unnecessary expense.

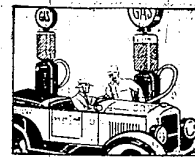
