New pavement will be laid on Grand River avenue from the Junction to the lumber yard some time this year. An adequate sewer to take care of the water and drainage must be built on that street before the new pavement is laid. The State Highway Department will build a storm sewer but not a sanitary sewer which the City requires. However, they are willing to co-operate with the City. The cost of a sanitary sewer is estimated at 15 or 20 thousand dollars. Granting that the State is willing to share this cost, it means a big moving for the City. It seems to the writer of these lines that this item is of such financial importance that it is in itself a strong argument in favor of the sewer proposition. Mr.oter, if you wish to save the City a nice sum of money and make the taxes that much lighter, vote yes in the election April 28.

NEW SEMI-AUTOMATIC
STARTER BEING USED

The new semi-automatic type of starter developed for the Oakland Eight and the New Series Pontiac Six is reported by Oakland engineers as the most important advancement in motor starting since the abandonment of hand cranking.

The new Oakland-Pontiac starter as perfected by the Delco-Remy Corporation, differs from

the starters previously used on these cars in one major respect—it does not commence to turn the engine until it first has fully engaged the starting teeth on the rim of the flywheel.

The first downward movement of the starter pedal slides the starting motor pinion into complete engagement with the flywheel teeth. Depressing the starter pedal further makes electrical contact which rotates armature and "cranks" the engine. The engineers assert that the positive pre-engagement feature prevents the pinion from jamming or chipping the teeth of the flywheel.

JUNIOR LIVE STOCK
SHOW BEING PLANNED

For the first time in Michigan's history the progressive youth of the State will be given a chance to enter into contest with their neighbors in a program designed to improve the market for first class, high valued live stock. Previous to this, Michigan's boys and girls have had to leave their native state for such competition and honors.

Announcement has been made of the holding of Michigan's first Junior Live Stock Show at the Detroit Stockyards, December 9, 10, and 11, 1930. The contest requires that participants must be prepared to enter the competition prior to May 15, 1930.

WHEELS AND TIRES ARE
BALANCED AT OAKLAND

Perfect balance of tires and wheels is essential to smooth operation of automobiles at the higher road speeds now in vogue, according to F. H. Kane, technical engineer for the Oakland Motor Car Company.

In the factories of our suppliers the wheels are carefully balanced by attaching small metal balancing weights to the felloes. The wheels again are tested when they reach the Oakland factory.

Similar care also is taken in balancing the tires and tubes in the factories which supply our original tire equipment.

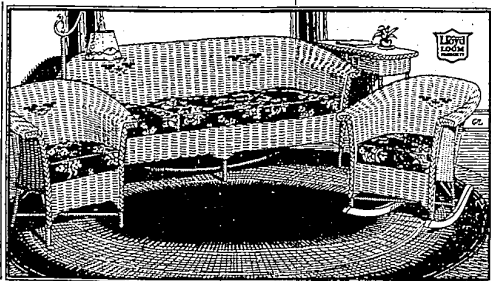
Mrs. Walsh was born in Canada. She had been ill about four months. Surviving are one son, Peter of Carsonville, two half brothers and one half sister.
