GREATER DEMAND FOR USED CARS REPORTED

Marked improvement in the sale of used cars throughout the United States is indicated by dealer reports received by the Oakland Motor Car Company.

The figures cover the period of March 1st to March 31st inclusive during which there normally is recorded a progressive increase in the sale of used cars.

During 1929, the period of March 10th to March 31st showed an increase of 209 per cent in used
