CALLED TO THREE FIRES

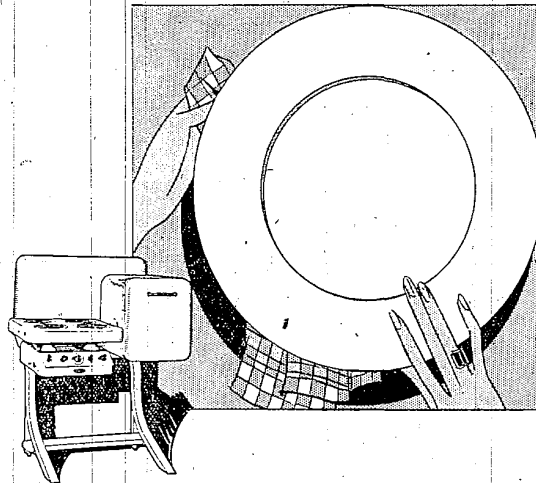
Three grass fires have called the Walled Lake fire department
