

SERVICE IS HELD FOR LEON GREEN, VETERAN D. U. R. MAN

Resident Of Farmington 21 Years Dies After Operation; Born In Commerce

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon for Leon C. Green, for over 20 years a resident of Farmington. Mr. Green who was 54 years old, died Saturday at Harper Hospital in Detroit, where he had undergone an operation the day before. He had been in ill health for about a year.

Mr. Green lived at Cass and Macomb streets in Farmington. He had been employed by the Detroit United Railways for 24 years.

Rev. George Gullen officiated at the funeral services and Dr. H. Addis Leeson offered a prayer. Interment was at Oakwood Cemetery.

Leon C. Green, son of the late George and Jennie Green, was born in Commerce Township May 23, 1876. His early days were spent in the vicinity of Walled Lake and Commerce. On September 16, 1900 he was married to Edith Webber. To them were born two sons. One son died in infancy.

Mr. Green had lived in Farmington for about 24 years, and had lived on the same corner for the past 20 years. He leaves his wife, one son, Forest Green, two grandchildren, Mahlon and Naomi of Walled Lake; three brothers and two sisters; Glen and John Green and Mrs. Ida Sheple of Farmington; George Green of Detroit, and Mrs. Eric Peterson of Chicago.

COMMERCE TOWNSHIP POPULATION IS 1,773

Commerce Township's population nearly doubled in the last ten years according to figures by D. D. Fisher census supervisor for Oakland County. The population in 1930 is given as 1773 and the population in 1920 was 914, a total gain of 859, and a gain in percentage of 94 per cent. The population given for the village of Walled Lake is 406. No record was found of the population in 1920, but it has always been considered as being 200. Separate counts of the villages of Commerce and Wixom was not made.

Ninety-four farms were worked in Commerce Township in 1929.

R. Kenneth Ryal was census enumerator for the Township.

White Lake Has 1,107 The population of White Lake Township, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, as shown by a preliminary count of the returns of the Fifteenth Census, taken as of April 1, 1930, is 1,107, as compared with 692 on January 1, 1920.


There were 88 farms enumerated in this area.

Highland Has 1,202 The population of Highland Township, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, as shown by a preliminary count of the returns of the Fifteenth Census, taken as of April 1, 1930, is 1,202, as compared with 1,075 on January 1, 1920.

There were 132 farms enumerated in this area.


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
