### CHRISTMAS SEAL SALES

1929 TOTAL 223,650

The 1929 sale of Christmas seals resulted in total proceeds of \$223,650, a semi-final report prepared by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association shows. Revenue from the seal sale finances the year's anti-tuberculosis program of the State Association and its 26 affiliated societies.

While returns from the 1929 sale were not entirely up to expectations, officials of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association state that constantly increasing demands for service have been made upon the Association in recent months. A substantial gain in the proceeds of the 1930 sale is looked for, by means of which it is hoped that these requests and those anticipated during coming months, may be met.

### WILL MAKE SURVEYS OF MICHIGAN SOILS

The soils survey program of State College for this year includes an inventory of the soils resources of Eaton, Montcalm, Bay, Montmorency, and Iron Counties. The survey in the southern counties is made in co-operation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture; and, in the two northern counties, the survey crew will include men from the State Conservation Department who will make accurate records of the recreational possibilities of the areas.

**Oxford Township Gains**  
The population of Oxford Township as shown by a preliminary count of the returns of the Fifteenth Census, taken as of April 1, 1930 is 2,967, as compared with 2,415 on January 1, 1920. There were 53 farms enumerated in this area.

### FARMINGTON H. S. BALL TEAM BEATS REDFORD HIGH, 2-1

Victory Is First For Farmington Over Redford Since 1923

Away back in 1923 the Farmington High School baseball team went down to Redford for a game and came home victorious, the score of that game being 5 to 1. On Tuesday Farmington made another trip down to Redford; and this time they played a Class A school instead of a Class C school but nevertheless came home victorious, the score being 2 to 1.

Cox went the entire route on the mound for the Trilons and gave the best exhibition of pitching seen this year. Redford collected only two hits of his delivery, and they were bunched in the fifth inning to score Redford's only run. One of these hits was a double. Cox's slow curves baffled Redford throughout the game.

The Redford pitcher held the Blue and White sluggers to one hit, Taggart getting a single in the third inning, a Texas leaguer over shortstop.

Turner was hit by a pitched ball in the sixth, permitting him to go to first. He then stole second and third and came in on Measell's sacrifice, which was hit to short. The shortstop could not field it fast enough to get Turner at the plate.

In the seventh the Redford pitcher hit McCulley. He stole second and went to third when the third baseman fumbled Nicholson's grounder. Nicholson was on first and McCulley on third. On the second pitch Nicholson broke for second and the catcher instead of holding the ball tried to throw him out; while he was doing this McCulley scored. Redford went out one, two, three, in their half of the seventh.

### DAIRYMEN PLAN WAYS TO INCREASE PROFIT

Recommendations made for the improvement of Michigan's dairy industry by 1,000 farmers who attended meetings sponsored by the Ann Arbor Railroad and Michigan State College included the close culling of poor cows, the improvement of the quality of dairy products, an increased acreage of alfalfa, and the use of purebred sires.

### CONTEST WILL SEEK BEST BEAN GROWERS

Search for the best bean growers in Michigan will be made this year by the farm crops department of Michigan State College through a contest sponsored jointly by the college, the Michigan Crop Improvement Association, and the Michigan Bean Jobbers Association.

Awards will be made to the 20 bean growers who receive the greatest margin of profit per acre from their crop. Production costs, yield, and quality of product will be considered in selecting the winners. A special award will be made to the individual grower having the best crop record for the season, based upon total acreage, crop rotation, cultural methods, and quality and yield.

### SHIPPED HOGS SHOW BIG LOSSES IN MAY

Records of the condition of livestock as it is received at the terminal markets shows that the death rate among shipped hogs is higher during May than any other month of the year.

A great deal of this loss can be eliminated if the proper precautions are taken when the hogs are loaded. Recommendations were made at the fourth annual meeting of the Livestock Loss Prevention Association in Lansing that all prospective shippers be warned of the measures necessary to reduce losses in shipment.

### TO DISCUSS TAX RELIEF

M. S. Winder, secretary of the American Farm Bureau Federation is to speak at the Farm Bureau District meeting to be held in Clarkston on Wednesday evening, May 21. Mr. Winder will discuss the Farm Bureau program of tax relief which has the approval of the 1200 delegates at the annual meeting of the Farm Bureau last December and has received favorable comment from the tax experts in every section of the United States.

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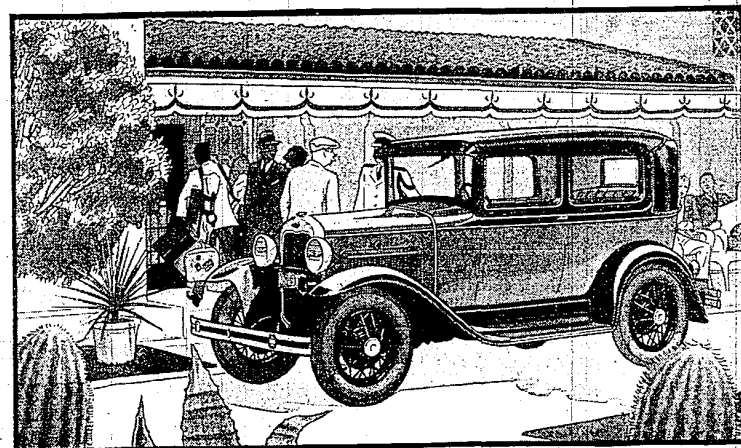
