Clarence Darrow And Dr. Wilson To Debate

Clarence Darrow, known as the world's foremost criminal lawyer, and Dr. Clarence True Wilson, general secretary of the Methodist Prohibition Board—two of the most spectacular figures in American life, are being brought together at Orchestra Hall, Detroit, Tuesday evening, May 27, for a discussion of prohibition, perhaps the most important issue of the day.

The debate, sponsored by Pishgah Lodge, No. 34 Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, will permit each speaker an hour for the statement of his proposition. Darrow will maintain that the 18th amendment should be repealed; Dr. Wilson will support the amendment. Darrow's argument will run for 25 minutes; Dr. Wilson will follow with 35 minutes; each speaker will have a 25-minute period and Darrow will close with a 10-minute rebuttal.

Judging by the overflow audience which Darrow debate will Durant under the same auspices and in the same hall three years ago, and considering the more-than-capacity crowds attending similar debates in leading cities of the United States, Orchestra Hall will be packed with thousands who want to hear two radically opposed authorities discuss the prohibition issue.

Detroit is one of the first cities to hear Mr. Darrow after his return from Europe. He arrived March 17th, after spending nine months in Europe. He has given up the practice of law after 50 years in the criminal courts, to devote himself to problems confronting the American public.
