BROTHERS ARE FIRST DRIVERS FROM BUENOS AIRES TO NEW YORK

After triumphing over fever, bandits, adverse weather conditions and having lazed their own trail over thousands of miles of mountain, jungle and desert country, two courageous Argentinians, driving a Chevrolet touring car, arrived in New York recently—the first to pilot an automobile from Buenos Aires to the United States.

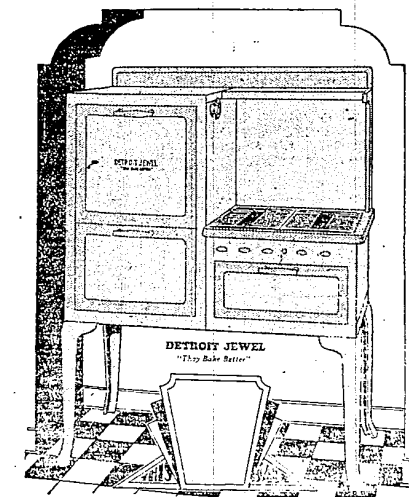
