times of Oakland County, and now a candidate for a fourth term, has hurt our feelings most something or other. We who on several occasions praised him a good man and great, fearless, tolerant, kindly, and sympathetic to the ill and ailments of the social order, are somewhat disturbed over Mr. Schram's most recent breach of etiquette.

"It appears that over in Farmington, Michigan, there resides a chap named Benjamin Meyers, who has been a deputy sheriff in Oakland County for about 15 years—one of those countless deputies that may exist in a County, and are called upon rarely to aid the sheriff. Recently, we learn, Mr. Meyers was seen talking to one William Wheeler, Royal Oak candidate against Mr. Schram this year, the day after Meyers and Wheeler were seen together, the following foolish—very foolish, we believe—letter was received by Mr. Meyers:

"Then follows the text of the letter to Mr. Meyers, in full, in which the sheriff declares that Mr. Meyers is 'not loyal to this office,' because he was, so the Sheriff believed, campaigning for another candidate." The Eccentric continues—

"This letter was, in the estimation of many who have discussed it, a very, very unwise thing to write by any sheriff, anytime, to anyone. Just what Mr. Meyers' loyalty to the office of sheriff should consist of, other than to be ready and willing to aid in the enforcement of law, we would be interested in learning from Sheriff Schram; it distinctly DOES NOT include any obligation to the sheriff for the re-election of the incumbent sheriff.

"Sheriff Schram, by his attitude toward Mr. Meyers, has placed a new interpretation upon his office in its relation to the public. He might just as well write every taxpayer who does not vote for him and say, in effect, that . . . due to the fact that I am going to be a candidate for the coming election, and knowing that you are a strong supporter and spending a great deal of your time in campaigning for another candidate, I feel that you are not loyal to this office at the present."

"Then, because he discharged Mr. Meyers for non-support of his re-election, Sheriff Schram might add that all taxpayers who refused to vote for him for a fourth term may look to places other than the Oakland County sheriff's office for aid and protection.

"It seems to us, who supported Sheriff Schram three times, that he should explain his action toward Mr. Meyers. Many others join us in the desire for such an explanation."

An improved type of airplane swing has been added to the equipment at the park. The planes are all equipped with propellers which make the airplane ride realistic.

In addition there is the roller coaster, merry-go-round with every conceivable sort of an animal to ride; the ferris wheel, miniature railroad and skater cars. The roller skating rink, ski-ball alley, shooting gallery and fun house, are all popular. Every type of clean amusement is available. The bath-house will accommodate thousands of people and is sanitary and modern.

DRIVER OF COUPE CARRYING LIQUOR CAUGHT IN CHASE

Deputies Pursue Man From Farmington To Novi; Pleads Not Guilty

A chase from Farmington to Novi by two deputy sheriffs this week resulted in the capture of a driver and his car, loaded with liquor, according to a report of Deputy Sheriff Joseph DeVriendt.

Deputy DeVriendt and Deputy John Murek of New Hudson picked up the car in Farmington, acting on a "hunch." They found in the car, they reported, 12 cases of whiskey and 10 gallons of alcohol.

The driver pleaded not guilty when arraigned and his examination was set for May 28. He gave a Lansing address.

Get Transferred Plates

A new popularity has attached to a motor vehicle "racket," it appears from report of Farmington deputy sheriffs. In recent weeks, according to Deputy Tamm and DeVriendt, have discovered 42 sets of transferred plates, most of them shifted from one car to another to avoid payment of 1930 license fee. Four cars of the 42 were found to have been stolen.

Cars Damaged

The cars of Arthur White and John Cox were badly damaged when they came together head on at the top of a hill on the Thirteen Mile road Tuesday night. It is reported Cox was driving on the wrong side of the road and White was against the bank when the cars met. No arrests were made. Cox was put on probation by Judge John J. Schulte of Farmington last week for reckless driving.

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
