"The Golden Orient," a beautiful story of old Japan, will provide the opening musical presentation.

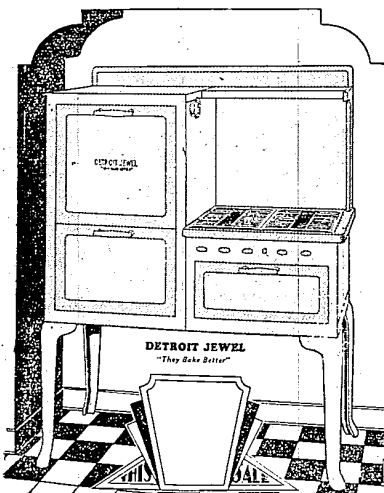
