**FIRES BROUGHT UNDER CONTROL, DAMAGE SMALL**

Fire destroyed a quantity of clothing and furnishings in a small cottage occupied by Dick Smith in the rear of the Banks Service Station on the Novi road, Monday evening about 8:00. The fire, believed to have been caused from a cigarette, was put out before the arrival of the Walled Lake fire department at the scene.

Although the fire was in Novi Township, both equipments responded. The Walled Lake truck, equipped with chemicals, and the Novi truck equipped with a booster pump and power pump present an efficient fire fighting force.

The home of Ross Carey in Commerce was damaged slightly by fire Sunday morning about 11. The fire was on the roof near the chimney and was believed to have been caused from sparks from the chimney. The fire was put out without the aid of the fire department.

**Fire At Garage**

While burning out oil drums at the Stone Front Garage, on Maple road at the corner of the Farmington road, the flames spread to oil on the ground and threatened a car and equipment at the garage. Quick work on the part of C. M. Hunter and Lyle Dickle prevented damage and the flames were extinguished with chemicals.

This is the second fire at the garage in the past month. Recently an oil soaked automobile cushion ignited and threatened serious damage within the garage, but was brought under control by C. M. Hunter with fire extinguishers.

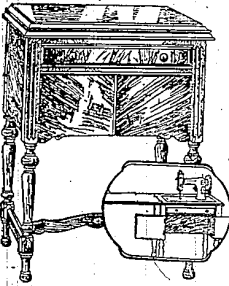
