Stokes Assault Case Is Settled

Six Hundred Dollars Paid To End Litigation On Incident In Farmington

The settlement was made this veek by Sheriff Frank Schram, who was also made a defendant n the case, along with his bonding company. The suit was for 5,000 damages.

While the money was paid by Sheriff Schram, it is understood that the real payment will be made by Deputy Sheriff Stokes, through an agreement made be-tween them.

The Massachusetts Bonding and Insurance Co., which bonded Sheriff Schram, was a defendant in the case.

The suit grew out of an incident in the police booth in Farmington on the evening of January 11, 1929. Lemeraud alleged that he was in the booth, waiting to report theft of some automobile parts, when Deputy Stokes walked into the booth and struck him, without provacation. He asserted that he lost several front teeth as a result, and that he was knocked from the front to the back room of the booth.

The purpose of the amendment is to permit the City to go ahead at once with taking of bids and construction of the additions to the sewer system. With approval of the amendment by a 60 per cent vote of the people, officials believe that it will be possible to receive bids and complete preparations for actual construction the latter part of this month.

Under the Home Rule Act of the State, up to two per cent of the assessed valuation may be contracted for in one year. In Farmington's case, this is about \$\$52,000.

In the Farmington Charter, however, the indebtedness that might be incurred in one year was restricted to one-half of one per cent, or in Farmington's present valuation, only \$13,000.
