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\$8,500 Is Far Too Much to Carry Like Change

Waco, Mass., Nov. 21.—Louis Wisniewski, a truckman of East Rochester, N. Y., with \$8,500 in his pocket, was picked up by the police here at night as he was walking through town on his way to Boston and locked up for the night. He said he was going to Boston to take a boat for Poland, his native country. He said he had been meeting with peasant difficulties. He was allowed to go on his way after he had deposited \$4,000 of his money in a bank here, and arranged to cash \$2,500 in postal savings by check.
