Died, October 27th, Artemus Jerome Tibbits, at the Tibbits hotel, 372 Winder street, Detroit, at the age of 66 years.

The funeral service was held at the home of the son, Karl Tibbits, Farmington, October 30, Rev. Frank Lyons of Jackson officiating, assisted by Rev. Duncan Ward of Farmington, who offered prayer. A large gathering of relatives and friends was evidence of the regard felt for the one who had gone to his reward. Rev. Frank Lyon is a cousin of Mrs. A. J. Tibbits and during his impressive sermon he said that in conversation with "Cousin Artie" he was convinced that he was a silent worshiper of God in nature.

Mr. Tibbits was bereft of a father's guidance at eight years of age and his love for his sainted mother influenced his life to a great extent. The Tibbits homestead was the dearest place in the world to him and the prosperity of "Fruit Ridge farm" was evidence of his executive ability. The Tibbits hotel, a clean, temperance, farmers' hotel is another proof of Mr. Tibbits' far-seeing wisdom.
