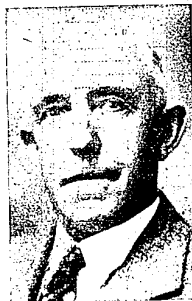

### PETITIONS FILED FOR ALLEN FOR ROAD COMMISSION

Chairman of Oakland County Road Commission Files Petitions

### STANDS FOR ECONOMY

Petitions for Luther D. Allen, Republican candidate to succeed himself as member of the Oak-



land County Road Commission, have been filed with the county clerk. Names on the petitions included citizens from every section of the County, suggesting the universal support of the people toward Mr. Allen's candidacy, as well as placing the stamp of approval upon his six years of effort to administer the duties of his office.

Mr. Allen was elected a member of the Road Commission six years ago; for the last two years he has been chairman of that body. Prior to his entering the Road Commission, he was Supervisor of Bloomfield Township for five years, and was chairman of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors. He is 62 years old, and lives on East Long Lake road, Bloomfield Hills Village, the same road that his parents lived on when he was born. Incidentally, it may be of interest to know that Mr. Allen's mother, now 91 years old, lives with her son within a mile of the homestead where, as a bride, she began housekeeping. Mr. Allen also serves his own Bloomfield Hills village as president.

### Stands For Economy

"Good roads are necessary to the progress of commerce and industry, and for the easy and safe transportation of people," stated Mr. Allen. "I have sought to bring to Oakland County people a sufficient program of good roads, without burdening them with taxes. My plan for the future, as a Road Commissioner, is to exercise great care in the building of good roads, taking into consideration the ability of people to have good roads, economically. I believe that my six years as a Road Commissioner have given me knowledge of value to Oakland County taxpayers; I pledge to them, with all the characterful background I possess, renewed effort to make my part in County government a satisfactory one in every respect."

When Mr. Allen was elected a member of the Road Commission six years ago Oakland County had 136 miles of hard surface roads, and now has 369 miles; in spite of the fact, too, that a number of former gravel roads have been hard surfaced since then, there are 15 miles more of gravel roads today than six years ago, a total of 370 miles of this type of road surface.

### Increase In Autos

Perhaps the greatest increase in the use of county roads by automobiles has taken place since Mr. Allen was elected to office, for traffic counts in Ferndale, on Woodward avenue, in 1924 were 15,164 cars for a 24 hour period; this year the same location reveals 56,588 cars daily.

Mr. Allen is a member of the First Methodist Episcopal church in Pontiac, a director in the First National Bank of Pontiac, and Birmingham. Prior to his acceptance of the nomination of Bloomfield Township Supervisor eleven years ago, Mr. Allen had spent many years as a successful farmer on the lands where he was born.
