FAIR IS TO BE
HELD NEXT WEEK

50th Year Exhibition In Milford
To Include Many
Features

With August comes the Oakland County Fair held this year on the sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth of the month when many people are still having their vacations and are in a mood for delightful entertainment. The 1930 exhibition will mark the 50th year since the first fair was held at Milford. Of the original promoters, none are left but the fair has continued and by its yearly exhibitions has furnished information and entertainment to two and three generations of its patrons.

For the 1930 fair the management promises the best possible showing of the staple exhibits which form the real reason for a fair, including livestock and farm crops, boys' and girls' club work, ladies' handicraft, school work, children's work, antiques, etc.

For entertainment there will be four days of horse racing, four ball games, three premier platform attractions, band concerts, rides and the ever present midway.

The feature of the evening program will be the Grand Pageant of Progress to be given on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. Last year's pageant proved to be the most popular feature ever presented at this fair and this year's will be equally fine. About 400 people are needed in the cast and groups are being rehearsed.

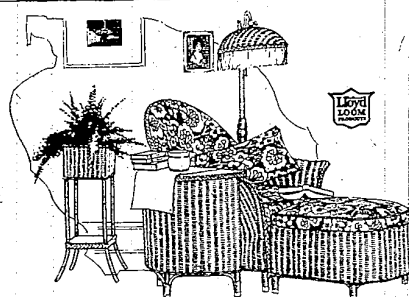
