### COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Recessed meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington, held July 28, 1930.

Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:50 p. m. Commissioners present, Goers, Otis, Hatton, Gildemeister and Staman.

Motion made by Otis, seconded by Goers that the following resolution be adopted: The City Commission of Farmington authorized the issuance of Fifty-two \$1,000 sewer bonds for the extension and improvement of the sewer system of the City with interest not to exceed 5 per cent per annum, and bearing date of August 1, 1930. The bonds to mature as follows: \$2,000 August 1, 1931 and each year thereafter up to and including August 1, 1941, \$3,000 August 1, 1942 and each year thereafter up to and including August 1, 1946; \$5,000 August 1, 1947 and each year thereafter up to and including August 1, 1949, interest payable semi-annually at the office of the City Treasurer of Farmington. Printing of the bonds to be paid for by the purchaser. Carried. Yeas, Goers, Otis, Hatton, Gildemeister, Staman and Lamb. Absent, Hogle.

Moved by Hatton, seconded by Staman that the estimated usefulness of the sewer now under proposal of construction will be thirty years or more. Carried. Yeas, Goers, Otis, Gildemeister, Staman, Hatton and Lamb. Absent, Hogle.

Motion made by Gildemeister, seconded by Otis that the City Clerk advertise the sale of \$53,000 worth of bonds for the extension and improvement of the sewer system of the City in the Michigan Investor. Carried.

Motion made by Staman, seconded by Goers, that the Clerk advertise for bids in the Michigan Investor and Builder for the construction of sewers as detailed in plans prepared by George H. Ruhling, civil engineer.

Regular meeting of the Commissioners of the City of Farmington, held August 4, 1930.

Called to order by Mayor Lamb at 7:45 P. M. Commissioners present, Hogle, Hatton, Staman, Gildemeister, Otis and Goers.

Minutes of the meetings of July 10 and 24 read and approved. The Clerk reported the receipts of \$1,705.05 Water money and \$357.87 from other sources to his office during the month of July making a total of \$2,062.92 received.

C. H. Ely addressed the Commission in regard to the bond submitted by C. W. Burton and Co., covering the Farmington Woods property.

Moved by Hogle that the following resolution be adopted: The City Commission of Farmington authorized the issuance of Fifty-two \$1,000 sewer bonds for the extension and improvement of the sewer system of the City with interest not to exceed 5 per cent per annum, and bearing date of August 1, 1930. Motion made by Hogle, seconded by Goers that the \$9000.00 note that the City owes to school district No. 5 be paid with interest if agreeable to the School Board.

Nine Mile road to grade to full width according to plans here attached and to gravel to width of nine feet. This street to be made passable within forty-five days and completed within one year from date. Farmington City further agrees to connect the now existing outlet for Lots 62 and 63 to the new sewer and to place convenient Y crocks for all lots traversed without expense to the respective owners. It is further agreed that any and all rights of the grantors in respect to the river are not affected.

Carried all yeas.

Moved by Otis, seconded by Goers that we appropriate \$500 to open and grade Brookdale avenue. Carried all yeas.

Motion made by Hogle, seconded by Otis, that the \$9000.00 note that the City owes to school district No. 5 be paid with interest if agreeable to the School Board.

Carried all yeas. Recessed until August 11. N. H. POWER, City Clerk.
