Further individuality in the selection of a car in the low priced field is made possible with the announcement that wire or disc wheels are now optional equipment, without extra cost, on new Chevrolet Six passenger cars.

Formerly disc wheels were standard equipment except for sport models, on which wire wheels were mounted at the factory. All passenger models are being shipped with wire wheels, while disc wheels also are being built to accommodate those purchasers who prefer this type.

The new wheel equipment is finished in a wide variety of colors to harmonize with the body trim of the nine different body models. The extensive color combinations used on the bodies, plus the added color harmonies available on the new wheels, will mean that the purchaser of a car in the low priced field will be able to obtain greater individuality in his car than was possible heretofore.

The option of wire or disc wheels went into effect on August 1. Dealers with cars having only disc wheels, at that time, were supplied with sets of new wire wheels to make the change-over for those purchasers desiring it.
