Township Taking Town Hall Matter to Court

cal act naming Farmington Township and City, which should be submitted to the people for ratification after passage by the Legislature. It was suggested that the next session meeting in January, would be a convenient time for offering the bill, to be followed by vote of the people in the Township at their election next Spring.

"Not Satisfied"

At the meeting of the Township Board Tuesday evening, Supervisor Coe told other members of the Board that he believed the proposed solution would not satisfy all in the Township, and that there was a movement on foot to circulate a petition, with the aim of forcing action by the Township Board, regardless of the proposed legislation. Justice Blanchard asked if this was not the feeling of some special interests, rather than a general view, but Supervisor Coe said that it was general in the north part of

the Township and named several residents of that section holding that opinion. Mr. Coe said that he was told "they wish wait until after tonight," and if no action was taken the steps to force the Board to act would follow. It was remarked that even permitting the Township to use the Town Hall would not settle the question of title, and Supervisor Coe said that "they want to know now who owns the Town Hall."

On motion of Justice Headerle, supported by Clerk Campbell, the Board voted to "authorize the Supervisor and Clerk to take action, in court or out, to clear the title on the Town Hall."
