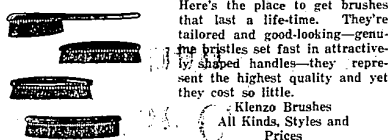

Farmington will again be the scene of an all-day and evening celebration on Labor Day, when Groves-Walker Post, American Legion, holds its ninth annual Gala Day. All of the features, which have made the event popular in previous years will be provided, and additional attractions also.
