Chevrolet Reduces Sport Model Prices

Price reductions of \$40 on all sport models in the Chevrolet six-passenger car line have been announced by H. J. Klingler, vice-president and general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Company. The models affected are the sport roadster, which is now priced at \$515; the sport coupe, reduced to \$515; the club sedan, now \$625, and the special sedan, \$685. All models formerly were priced \$40 higher.

This latest move of the company brings the price range of the Chevrolet six to less than the range of the four cylinder Chevrolet at the time of the change-over at the close of 1928. At that time the four was priced from \$495 to \$715, while the nine different passenger models in the six cylinder line today range from \$495 to only \$685, following this latest reduction.

The move of the company comes directly after the announcement that wire wheels may now be had as optional equipment without extra cost on any Chevrolet six passenger car.

Trees May Be Injured

The practice used by some Michigan orchard owners of ringing or girdling the branches of apple trees to hasten the time when the trees will bear fruit may be the means of seriously injuring the trees by the introduction of disease organisms into the wounds made by the cutting tools, it has been found by members of the horticultural department at Michigan State College.

In the commercial orchard in the state where the practice of ringing has been used, 146 out of 437 Baldwin trees which had been ringed were badly infected with blight which had gained entrance through the cuts in the bark. Conditions in the orchard showed that the disease infection had been carried from tree to tree in the rows as the workmen performed the ringing.

The horticultural department recommends that if ringing is to be practiced, the knives used should be disinfected before each cut is made.

The formula for a disinfecting solution for use on the knives will be given to anyone who requests it from the State College department.
